Despite the highly competitive market, the Hambys continued their search. Initially wanting a mere 2.5 acres, their measurements would exponentially increase to 5 acres, then to 10 acres. he next step for Hunter and Darcy was to make small improvements on their new land. Hunter spent a week working on building a fence perimeter around the 10 acres after the sale had been finalized. Due to his unusual firefighter schedule, he worked tirelessly to get the work done. Every morning he was up and out by 5 a.m. and didn't return home until 1-2 the following morning. This was just the first of many steps in making the property their own. In the next five years, the couple is planning on building their dream home on their dream property. By using the equity they will have saved in paying on the land, they will have a great start in investing in the home they've always wanted. In addition, Darcy is passionate about training and getting actively involved in competing in reined cowhorse, so building a round pen and arena is the next top priority. Currently, the Hambys have two or three horses turned out at a time. Since the pair both have full-time jobs, their friends and neighbors regularly utilize this small remuda and swap them out while working their own operations.

Banking online

When there's no time to drop by your Plains Land Bank (PLB) office, use Ag Banking Online (ABOL) to manage your accounts anytime, anywhere.

- Make loan payments
- · Receive electronic billing statements
- View account activity such as loan balances, payments, interest paid and patronage history
- Set up future and recurring transactions
- Send and receive secure messages about your accounts
- Change date and dollar amount on recurring fund transfers

Ag Banking Online also features face and fingerprint recognition. Or you can use a four-digit PIN. And more upgrades are coming, like viewing and uploading loan documents from home.

To get started, go to *plainslandbank.com/abol*. Complete and submit the enrollment forms. If you need assistance, contact your local PLB office.

Once we receive your forms, we'll call you to verify your identity. Then we'll email you login instructions.

If you already use Ag Banking Online, download our mobile app. Look for Plains Land Bank in Apple's App Store or the Google Play store.

Business via cell

You can also conduct business over the phone with our FastCash program. With just one phone call, you can make a loan payment without leaving your home or tractor cab. FastCash allows you to transfer funds from your bank checking or savings account as soon as that day.



PLAINS LAND BANK RETURNS \$8.5 MILLION IN PATRONAGE TO BORROWERS

It's rare for lenders to return interest payments to their borrowers. But not for Plains Land Bank.

This spring, we returned \$8.5 million of our 2019 earnings to our borrowers in patronage!

The patronage payment, which was distributed in cash, was based on the lending co-op's strong financial results in 2019.

The size of your individual patronage refund depended on your loan balance and interest rate. The more interest income your loan generated for the co-op, the bigger your patronage payment.

Patronage is a co-op benefit

Patronage refunds are a distinct benefit of financing with Plains Land Bank. You not only receive a competitive rate up front, you also get interest back as patronage when the co-op does well.

Patronage effectively lowers your cost of borrowing.

- This year, Plains Land Bank returned an average of 26 cents of every dollar borrowers paid in interest in 2019.
- A borrower with a 5% interest rate would have effectively paid just 3.7% in 2019 after receiving this year's patronage refund.
- This year, Plains Land Bank returned 56% of our 2019 net income to our borrowers.

At Plains Land Bank, every borrower is a co-op stockholder. Your hard work and resilience helped contribute to the co-op's success.
